Tree Descriptions

White Spruce (*Picea glauca*) - Thrives in full sun and well-drained moist soil. Withstands wind, heat, cold, drought, and crowding. Very hardy. Medium growth rate, to 50 ft.

Colorado Blue Spruce (*Picea pungens glauca*) – Medium growth rate. Height to 100 ft. Adaptable-prefers rich, moist soil in full sun; also thrives on dry, well-drained sites.

Concolor Fir (*Abies concolor*) – Very hardy in a variety of well-drained soils, withstands dryness and high temperatures. Height to 50 ft. Excellent Christmas tree.

White Pine (*Pinus strobus*) - Excellent windbreak and hedge. Long, soft needles. Great for Christmas trees, wildlife habitat, or as an ornamental. Transplants easily in a wide range of soils. Fast growing to 100 ft.

Douglas Fir (*Pseudotsuga menziesii*) - Grows medium. Height to 100 ft. Prefers moist, well-drained soil and good air circulation.

Fraser Fir (*Abies fraseri*) – Grows slow. Height to 40 ft. Needs well-drained soil. Horizontal branching, shiny dark green, 1/2 to 1 inch long, flat needles with round tips.

White Oak (*Quercus alba*) - Long-lived and slow growing on all but the wettest sites when given full sun to light shade. Valuable for both wildlife and forestry purposes. Acorns are among the most prized by animals. Strong, durable wood is very valuable. Makes attractive lawn or shade tree. Grows to 50 to 80 ft.

Red Oak (*Quercus rubra*) - Dark green leaves turn russet red in fall. Medium brown acorns are among the first of the landscape oaks to ripen, providing an early harvest for animals. A superb large-area shade tree. Prefers acidic, well-drained sites but will adapt to most soils. Valuable timber tree. Grows 60 to 75 ft.

Sugar Maple (*Acer saccharum*) - Mature trees provide sugar products from sap in spring. Brilliant yellow, burnt orange, and red tones in autumn. Prefers moist, well-drained soils. Height to 75 ft.

Chinese Chestnut (*Castanea mollissima*) - Reaches a height and spread of about 40 feet in a sunny, open exposure and a well-drained soil. It usually branches close to the ground making it a good candidate for a specimen or as a tree to climb. A very striking tree.

Yellow Birch (*Betula alleghaniensis*) – 60' to 75' tall, best in full sun. Cool, moist soils are preferred. Showy yellow autumn foliage. Broken twigs have wintergreen smell.

Siberian Crabapple (*Malus baccata*) - Rounded canopy of spreading branches, ultimately reaching 20 to 50 feet in height. The very fragrant blooms appear in great abundance, and the single, 1.5-inch-diameter flowers are pink when in bud but open up to white. Blooms are followed in fall by long-lasting, bright red or yellow fruits which are very popular with the birds or can be used to make a delicious jelly.

Washington Hawthorn (*Crataegus phaenopyrum*) – Medium sized deciduous tree, 25' to 30' tall, 20' to 25' wide. Prefers moist, fertile soil. Easy to grow. Great for screen or hedge. Fruit matures September-October, loved by birds.

American Plum (*Prunus americana*) – Small, deciduous tree 12-25' tall, up to 20' wide. White flowers bloom in April, yellow to red fruits mature in July. Attractive to birds. Prefers full sun to part shade. Tolerates all soil types, from acidic to alkaline, wet to dry.

Winterberry (*Ilex verticillata*) - One of the best plants for fall and winter color. Height and spread 6-12 ft. Likes acid soil. Used as a wetland plant. Attracts winter songbirds. Very good shrub for a screen or background.

Nannyberry (*Viburnum lentago*) - An attractive large shrub or small tree. Leaves turn to purplish-red in fall. Large white blossoms open up in May, followed by green, yellow, rose, and pink fruit that mature to purplish black. Plant where air movement is best to avoid mildew. Grows 15 to 18 ft. high, quite variable in spread.
